Stephanie Danz, *Untitled (Light Fixture)*, bike wheel and stained glass, 2016 Stephanie, owner of Mountain Art Glass, is a local artisan with work on display at Tamarack and throughout the region. She specializes in making glass jewelry and kaleidoscopes.

*Steve Pauley, Untitled (Huntington, WV, House Interior), oil on canvas, 24 x 30 inches, 1990s. This artwork is from Steve's exhibition in the Birke Gallery, Marshall University, where he painted many architectural studies. Steve was a student at WV State College, where he received his BA in art. He went on to earn an MA at MU, and an MFA at the Maryland Institute of Art, Baltimore, MD. He is from St. Albans, and resides in New York City.

Paula Clendenin, Ambition, oil on wood, 2006

Paula Clendenin grew up in Cedar Grove, WV and now resides in Charleston. She received her BA and MFA degrees from West Virginia University and served as an art professor for many years at West Virginia State University while creating and showing her work throughout the United States. *Ambition* was the 2016 Art Fund purchase for Lafayette Flats.

*Mark Tobin Moore, Coal II, mixed media on canvas, 30x 30 inches, 2005 Moore taught art at many WV universities. He was the Director of Exhibits and Curator of Contemporary Art at the Culture Center in Charleston. Additionally, he was the Supervisory Art Specialist in the US Army in Giessen, Germany. Moore earned a BA in Studio Art from the University of Charleston, an MA in Art from Marshall University, and a MFA (Terminal Degree) in Visual Arts from West Virginia University. He has been showing art nationally and internationally for 30 years. **Charles Jupiter Hamilton**, *Bare There Were They*, self-pulled block print, 2004 Highly expressive and known for his humor - in his life and art - Charly's elaborate patterns come together in a kind of "new world primitivism." Charly's art is laced with enthusiasm and child-like mischief. His work has received a warm recognition in and beyond the borders of West Virginia and has won many prizes and awards.

*Michael Ivey, Peace - River Guide Helmet, hand printed black and white silver gelatin print, 8 x 11 inches, early 1990s. Additional prints are on exhibit at Adventures on the Gorge. Michael lives in Columbus, OH, and is a free-lance film maker and commentator who has been heard on many occasions on WV Public Radio.

Firenzo Janutolo, Piedicavallo, 1903

This crest was hand drawn by Fierenzo, the son of the Italian stone mason who constructed this building in 1904. Mary Anton, the great grand-daughter of the mason, Antonio Janutolo, grew up in Fayetteville. She gifted this family heirloom to us during the renovation of the building in 2013.

Shawn Means, Fayetteville in 1954 - As Seen on TV, mixed media, 2013 Co-owner of Lafayette Flats, Shawn, cleaned and touched up the face of an old 1950s television we found in the basement of this building. The photo, also a product of the 1950s, was enlarged with permission from Dale Payne's book about Fayette County. This building is visible in the far right of the photograph.

West Virginia fine artist and illustrator, Staci Leech-Cornell was raised in Greenbrier County, West Virginia where she grew to love her family's incredible collections of ceramic birds and other knick-knacks. That love is now expressed through her drawings, paper works, and gouache paintings.

Harper passed in 2007 leaving behind a huge collection of pictures featured in National Park Service posters, Procter & Gamble advertisements, Golden Books and much more.

He lists on his website as inspiration: coffee, cigarettes, comic books, history, avoiding people, crappy sci-fi, witchcraft, moral panic epidemics, gallows humor, sex, violence, and intoxicating substances of varying degrees of legality.

Villamagna has an MA in Art Therapy from Wright State University.

He was the Chair of the Art Department at the University of Charleston from the early 1970s to the late 1980s. Hank Keeling passed away in 2010.

Talented muralist, graphic designer and illustrator, Jesse Corlis, has been commissioned to create and restore large-scale murals throughout West Virginia. You will find this Braxton County native's work on the Interstate 64 piers in Charleston, the flood wall in Point Pleasant, The Museum of American Glass in Weston and on the walls of many locally owned businesses. Jesse restored Charleston's largest mural – "Home is Where the Art is" – on Habitat for Humanity of Kanawha & Putnam as well as the historic "White Elephant Salon" mural inside Pies and Pints in Charleston.
